Are you pregnant and planning to have your baby at a public hospital?

Would you like to have your GP and hospital share the care of you and your baby during pregnancy?

What is GP Obstetric Shared Care?

An option of pregnancy care for women birthing in South Australia.

Your GP provides most of your pregnancy care with minimal hospital visits required.

Your GP must follow clear protocols for your care and be accredited with GP Obstetric Shared Care SA ensuring a high standard of care.

If any complications develop during your pregnancy, your GP will refer you back to the hospital for specialist care as required.

Hospital doctors and midwives will care for you during labour and birth.

Your GP provides the care after discharge from hospital for you and your baby.

Who is this program for?

GP Obstetric Shared Care is for healthy women enjoying a normal pregnancy.

How do I get more information?

You can ask your GP or clinic staff whether your GP or another GP at the practice is accredited.

You can ask them to help you find an accredited GP.

Why choose GP Obstetric Shared Care?

You can see the same doctor (your GP) for most of your antenatal visits.

You know the doctor and they know your medical history.

Appointment times with your GP are often more convenient than at a hospital.

GPs often have shorter waiting times than hospital clinics and are often closer to home.

Care once you return home after delivery is provided by the same doctor (your GP).

Your GP offers comprehensive continuity of care for your whole family as they grow.

In rural or remote areas, seeing your GP can be easier than getting to the public hospital. Specific arrangements need to be discussed with your GP at the beginning of your pregnancy.

What do I need to do?

There are 2 simple steps to joining the Obstetric Shared Care Program:

1 Visit yo to ensu

Visit your GP as early in your pregnancy as possible to ensure your pregnancy starts well.



Call the public hospital to 'book into' that hospital when you are between 10-16 weeks pregnant.

Remember to inform the hospital receptionist that you are doing 'shared care'.
